MGSB was founded in 1995. The program was organized to provide services to victims of domestic violence. Today Mt. Graham Safe House provides crisis intervention, assessment of immediate needs, food and clothing, advocacy and referrals to different agencies and services, self help groups, and prevention education in a confidential environment. Primary service areas are Graham and Greenlee Counties and the San Carlos Apache Nation.

Advocacy Program

Victim advocate offices located in Graham and Greenlee Counties. Our Greenlee office is located in the Gila Health Resources building in Morenci.

24/7 emergency room response and advocacy. Response time varies by location of emergency room please call for your local response time.

Safe escort and advocacy for domestic violence related issues which may include medical, legal and other social service systems

Lay legal advocacy, which includes assistance with orders of protection, victim compensation paperwork, divorce and VAWA self petitions.

Support and information for domestic violence and sexual assault victims and their families.

A participant does not need to reside in the shelter to receive services.

Children's Advocacy

Each child in residence will have their own advocate and special time just for themselves with their advocate. This advocate will provide support for the children while in shelter.

Children's Domestic Violence Program

Children ages 2-12 in the program will learn about conflict resolution, anger management, and safety plans using a comprehensive domestic violence education curriculum.

Residential Services

Safe Emergency Housing

Short-term emergency housing, food and clothing for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault.

Transportation

Transportation may be available for appointments, court hearings and for work.

Crisis Shelter for Small Pets

Families in residence may choose to bring their small pets, (dogs, cats, birds, etc.) with them to shelter to keep them safe from an abusive partner. Please contact your advocate for more information.

Criteria for Admittance to Crisis Shelter

To be admitted into the crisis shelter:

- A victim must be over the age of 18 and a victim of domestic violence and/or sexual assault.
- They must want and need assistance.
- Persons who are under the influence of drugs or alcohol must be sober before entering the shelter.
- They must be able to care for themselves and their children.

Self Help Group

A self help group is offered weekly for survivors of domestic violence. Please contact an advocate for dates and times.

Tools for Success

Tools for success is a program to help victims of domestic violence gain financial independence by helping give them the tools needed to start their own small business.

Non-Residential Services

Victims of domestic violence and/or sexual assault who otherwise have a safe place to stay may choose to seek our non residential services. Services provided include all services available to residential participants. Including assistance with long and short term planning, support groups, access to resources, lay legal advocacy and emergency services such as food, clothing, home furnishings and household items.

Prevention Education

Advocates teach a dating violence prevention curriculum to middle school and high school aged students.

Transitional Housing

This program consists of two one-bedroom apartments, a laundry room and a common room for meetings and groups. This allows those who have completed the residential program to stay for as long as two years giving them time to adjust to their new life-style, allowing them to secure jobs, education, transportation and homes.
