

Dr. Seuss Teaches Us A Thing or Two About Raising Student Achievement

“You're never too old, too wacky, too wild, to pick up a book and read to a child.” Those words are from Dr. Seuss, well-known author of almost 50 children’s books, including *Green Eggs & Ham*. Not commonly known is that Seuss wrote most of his books at the request of a publisher reacting to a 1954 story that said illiteracy in children resulted from kids’ boredom. The publisher challenged Seuss to write books that featured 250 common words *and* entertained children. The result: the beloved *Cat in the Hat*.

Sixty years later, the wisdom of that idea – that kids learn when we read fun books with them – has never been truer. In fact, vocabulary levels at ages 3 and 4 are predictors of reading comprehension in third and fourth grade.



At a time when we are focused on raising academic achievement, the one solution we can ALL be part of is simple. Read to kids – starting at birth – for 15-30 minutes daily.

For infants, reading and others interactions with adults help their brain learn the sounds needed to develop language. As they grow, reading helps babies understand that objects have names, and that words represent those names. As children get older, reading helps them to learn letters, sounds, increased vocabulary, and higher concepts such as: past/present tense, subject/verb agreement, critical thinking when you ask them what comes next in a story; and, of course, the knowledge that book’s content has to offer. That’s quite a lot of learning for just 30 minutes a day!

Seuss’ contributions to children’s literature are why the National Education Association uses his March birthday month to encourage reading at schools around the nation. We should follow their example and extend that to include every nursery, child’s room, living room, dining room and kitchen.

As a result, our children will start building the language and literacy skills they will need to succeed in school and in life. To quote the immortal Theodor Geisel (a.k.a Seuss): “The more that you read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you'll go!”



On March 6th at Thatcher's Jack Daley Primary school, second graders were jumping out of their seats to answer questions and tell their Internet experiences with nine of Thatcher High School's Future Business Leaders of America members who taught them about how to stay safe online. The FBLA members who presented included; Skyler Lines, Emmi Yla-Pymmonen, Anqush Kumar, Kelsey Meehl, Aleks Palmer, Thomas Cope, Wayne McBride, Megan Milton, and Caleb Radley. The reaction and interaction between students with a ten year difference was exhilarating to see. The FBLA members shared stories and experiences that helped the second graders to connect and learn from the high school students. Two of the FBLA members who presented are exchange students from New Zealand and Finland. The students loved this fact and when shown on a map the distance between countries they were certainly awestruck. The students were riveted to the presenters from the start and comprehended everything they were taught. The FBLA members, dressed in Business Professional dress, demonstrated three school rules that they should follow.

These rules included:

1. Always ask your parents first.
2. Only talk to people you know.
3. Only go to places that are right for you.




The FBLA students even shared a video from "Common Sense Media" a free Digital Literacy Curriculum Education Program, which helped reinforce the rules taught. After FBLA members reviewed the rules with the second graders, they left the teachers a parent tip sheet to give to their parents. When all the teaching was done, the teachers and second grade students were given "Mr. Eagle" with an FBLA shirt to keep safe and remind them of the rules that were taught to them about staying safe online.
